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Repository of Good Practices

1.1. What is the aim of collecting good practices in the LOCALIENCE project?

In our pursuit of fostering community engagement and empowerment, we've prioritized the collection of project-related good practices that resonate with local communities. Our focus extends to initiatives that excel in local awareness raising and training activities, recognizing their pivotal role in driving meaningful change. These exemplary practices not only inspire but also serve as foundational templates for crafting comprehensive training materials and strategic communication action plans. By harnessing the lessons embedded within these good practices, we aim to fortify our approach, ensuring that our efforts resonate deeply within the fabric of each unique community we serve.

1.2. What should we know about the LOCALIENCE project?

The official title of the project is "Developing resilience against extreme weather threats caused by climate change at local level in Central Europe" which summarizes well our aim.

Intensity of extreme weather events resulting from climate change have increased in CE and will continue to grow. LOCALIENCE partners have a shared disaster management weakness: professionals provide one-directional, frontal information and services to stakeholders, considering them as mere recipients, instead of building on collaborative and interactive measures, and exploiting all available capacities. This challenge can be most effectively tackled on the local level: settlements concentrate citizens and assets at risk, offer locations for on-the-ground cooperation, can sensitize and mobilize local communities and can effectively test novel solutions.

The overall aim of LOCALIENCE is to improve response capacities and resilience to extreme weather events through enhanced collaboration of disaster management professionals with local, non-professional public and civil stakeholders, through improved capacities on both sides, feasible solutions exploring interactivity and end-user inclusion and justified policy improvement. LOCALIENCE connects transnational partners facing similar extreme weather threats, benefitting from a vast Central European pool of professional institutions and their experience, exploring solutions aimed at multiple aspects of the same challenge but offering sound learning and transfer potential, transnational peer-review and co-creation, as well as long-term networking, data sharing and service integration prospects in a compact geographical area.

1.3. When and who filled out the good practice templates?

1.4. What actions are supported by the good practices?

During the kick-off meeting, we had to narrow down in what exact topics we want to collect good practices to make it understandable. At the co-designing workshop, we identified two important topics, that could be supported by good practices and we could gain additional inspiration from them: trainins activites and local awareness raising actions.

According to ths, the good practices mainly provide information to the following deliverables:

- D.2.1.2 Plans for local/national/CE-level communication and PR campaigns, concepts for training activities
- D.2.2.1 Training syllabuses and locally adapted mutations of 3 tailored training programs
- D.2.3.1 Online knowledge repository to disseminate experiences and validated new methods of LOCALIANCE

1.5. What type of information can we find out about the collected good practices?

The template combines all important information, in a short and compact way. Each filled out template is enough to decide wether you are interested in that measure or not. As it is explained above, we collected good practices in two different topics to support our work. The tamplate is the same for both topics, but in case of one question it differs. This defines what type of good practice we are reading about.

At the overall description part, a few guiding questions help you through understanding each good practice.











- Who were the target audience?
- Summary and detailed description of the good practice
- What was the allocated budget?
- Evidence of success and how it was measured
- Challenges they faced
- Timescale

1.6. Why did we collect trainings and awareness raising good practices?

At the beginning of pur project implementation we had to define what type of good practices do we want to collect, since the subject was so broad it made it hard to define what exactly are considered good practices in our case.
